Section A: Augustus

Answer **Question 1** and **either** Question 2 **or** Question 3.

1 Read the passage and answer the questions:

Augustus turned the kingdom of Egypt into a Roman province; and then, to increase its fertility and its yield of grain for the Roman market, set troops to clean out the irrigation canals of the Nile Delta which had silted up after many years' neglect. To perpetuate the glory of his victory at Actium, he founded a city close to the scene of the battle and named it Nicopolis – or 'City of Victory' – and made arrangements for the celebration of Games there every five years. He also enlarged an ancient local temple of Apollo, and embellished his camp with trophies taken from Antony's fleet, consecrating the site jointly to Neptune and Mars.

- (a) (i) In which year did the Battle of Actium (line 4) take place? [1]
- (ii) Who commanded Augustus' forces in the Battle of Actium? [1]
- (iii) Which Egyptian queen was married to Antony (line 7)? [1]
- (iv) What were Neptune and Mars (line 8) the gods of? [2]
- (b) Using this passage as a starting point, explain how far Augustus' reorganisation of the provinces made life better for the inhabitants of the provinces. [20]

Section B: Virgil's *Aeneid*

4 Read the passage and answer the questions:

He was veiled in a blue-green cloak of fine-spun flax and dark reeds shaded his hair. He then spoke to Aeneas and lightened his sadness with these words: 'O you who are born of the race of the gods, who are bringing back to us the city of Troy saved from its enemies, who are preserving its citadel Pergamum for all time, long have we waited for you in the land of the Laurentines and the fields of Latium. This is the home that is decreed for you. This is the home decreed for the gods of your household. Do not give it up. Do not be intimidated by the threat of war. All the angry passions of the gods are now spent. But come now, so that you may not think what you are seeing is an empty dream, I tell you that you will find a great sow with a litter of thirty piglets lying beneath ilex trees on a shore. There she will lie all white on the ground and the young around her udders will be white. This will be a sign that after three times ten years revolve, Ascanius will found the city of Alba, white in name and bright in glory. What I prophesy will surely come to pass. Attend now and I shall teach you in few words how you may triumphantly resolve the difficulties that lie before you.'

- (ii) How is Aeneas 'born of the race of the gods' (line 3)? [1]
- (iii) In what ways is Aeneas 'bringing back to us the city of Troy' (line 3)? [2]
- (iv) Who is Ascanius (line 12)? [1]
- (b) Using this passage as a starting point, discuss how successfully Virgil explores the theme of fate and the future of Rome in Book 8 of the *Aeneid*. [20]

- (b) 'The finest example of this type of monument.'
How far do you agree with this assessment? In your answer, you should include discussion of this monument and **one** other monument of the same type. [20]
