  - (b) “Why do your disciples transgress the tradition of the elders? For they do not wash their hands when they eat.” (Matthew 15:2)
  - (c) “...the voice of one crying in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.” (Mark 1:3)
  - (d) Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand and touched him, and said to him, “I will; be clean.” (Mark 1:41)
  - (e) As he drew near to the gate of the city, behold, a man who had died was being carried out, the only son of his mother, and she was a widow; and a large crowd from the city was with her. (Luke 7:12)
  - (f) The master commended the dishonest steward for his prudence; for the sons of this world are wiser in their own generation than the sons of light. (Luke 16:8)
  - (g) When Jesus saw him and knew that he had been lying there a long time, he said to him, “Do you want to be healed?” (John 5:6)
  - (h) “Why was this ointment not sold for three hundred denarii and given to the poor?” (John 12:5)

  - (e) As he approached the town gate, a dead person was being carried out – the only son of his mother, and she was a widow. And a large crowd from the town was with her. (Luke 7:12)

- 11 Analyse what the miracles of Jesus show about the culture of that time. [25]
- 12 Examine the reasons why Jesus encountered opposition during his ministry. [25]
- 13 Outline the main purposes behind the Gospels of Mark and John and identify their audiences. [25]
- 14 How far do the birth narratives in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke agree with each other? [25]

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
