1 Given that

$$y = x^2 \sin x,$$

(i) show that the mean value of  $\frac{dy}{dx}$  with respect to  $x$  over the interval  $0 \leq x \leq \frac{1}{2}\pi$  is  $\frac{1}{2}\pi$ , [2]

(ii) find the mean value of  $\frac{d^2y}{dx^2}$  with respect to  $x$  over the interval  $0 \leq x \leq \frac{1}{2}\pi$ . [2]

2 Relative to an origin  $O$ , the points  $A, B, C$  have position vectors

$$\mathbf{i}, \quad \mathbf{j} + \mathbf{k}, \quad \mathbf{i} + \mathbf{j} + \theta\mathbf{k},$$

respectively. The shortest distance between the lines  $AB$  and  $OC$  is  $\frac{1}{\sqrt{2}}$ . Find the value of  $\theta$ . [6]

3 The curve  $C$  has equation

$$y = \frac{x^2 - 5x + 4}{x + 1}.$$

(i) Obtain the coordinates of the points of intersection of  $C$  with the axes. [2]

(ii) Obtain the equation of each of the asymptotes of  $C$ . [3]

(iii) Draw a sketch of  $C$ . [3]

4 It is given that

$$x = t + \sin t, \quad y = t^2 + 2 \cos t,$$

where  $-\pi < t < \pi$ . Find  $\frac{dy}{dx}$  in terms of  $t$ . [2]

Show that

$$\frac{d^2y}{dx^2} = \frac{2t \sin t}{(1 + \cos t)^3}. \quad [4]$$

Show that  $\frac{dy}{dx}$  increases with  $x$  over the given interval of  $t$ . [2]

5 The equation

$$x^3 + 5x + 3 = 0$$

has roots  $\alpha, \beta, \gamma$ . Use the substitution  $x = -\frac{3}{y}$  to find a cubic equation in  $y$  and show that the roots of this equation are  $\beta\gamma, \gamma\alpha, \alpha\beta$ . [4]

Find the exact values of  $\beta^2\gamma^2 + \gamma^2\alpha^2 + \alpha^2\beta^2$  and  $\beta^3\gamma^3 + \gamma^3\alpha^3 + \alpha^3\beta^3$ . [5]

6 Show that

$$\frac{d}{dx}[x^{n-1}\sqrt{(4-x^2)}] = \frac{4(n-1)x^{n-2}}{\sqrt{(4-x^2)}} - \frac{nx^n}{\sqrt{(4-x^2)}}. \quad [3]$$

Let

$$I_n = \int_0^1 \frac{x^n}{\sqrt{(4-x^2)}} dx,$$

where  $n \geq 0$ . Prove that

$$nI_n = 4(n-1)I_{n-2} - \sqrt{3},$$

for  $n \geq 2$ . [2]

Given that  $I_0 = \frac{1}{6}\pi$ , find  $I_4$ , leaving your answer in an exact form. [4]

7 Use de Moivre's theorem to express  $\sin^6 \theta$  in the form

$$a + b \cos 2\theta + c \cos 4\theta + d \cos 6\theta,$$

where  $a, b, c, d$  are constants to be found. [5]

Hence evaluate

$$\int_0^{\frac{1}{4}\pi} \sin^6 2x dx,$$

leaving your answer in terms of  $\pi$ . [4]

8 (a) The curve  $C_1$  has equation  $y = -\ln(\cos x)$ . Show that the length of the arc of  $C_1$  from the point where  $x = 0$  to the point where  $x = \frac{1}{3}\pi$  is  $\ln(2 + \sqrt{3})$ . [5]

(b) The curve  $C_2$  has equation  $y = 2\sqrt{(x+3)}$ . The arc of  $C_2$  joining the point where  $x = 0$  to the point where  $x = 1$  is rotated through one complete revolution about the  $x$ -axis. Show that the area of the surface generated is

$$\frac{8}{3}\pi(5\sqrt{5} - 8). \quad [5]$$

- 9 Show that if  $y$  depends on  $x$  and  $x = e^u$  then

$$x^2 \frac{d^2y}{dx^2} = \frac{d^2y}{du^2} - \frac{dy}{du}. \quad [4]$$

Given that  $y$  satisfies the differential equation

$$x^2 \frac{d^2y}{dx^2} + 5x \frac{dy}{dx} + 3y = 30x^2,$$

use the substitution  $x = e^u$  to show that

$$\frac{d^2y}{du^2} + 4 \frac{dy}{du} + 3y = 30e^{2u}. \quad [2]$$

Hence find the general solution for  $y$  in terms of  $x$ . [5]

- 10 The curve  $C$  has polar equation

$$r = a \sin 3\theta,$$

where  $0 \leq \theta \leq \frac{1}{3}\pi$ .

- (i) Show that the area of the region enclosed by  $C$  is  $\frac{1}{12}\pi a^2$ . [3]

- (ii) Show that, at the point of  $C$  at maximum distance from the initial line,

$$\tan 3\theta + 3 \tan \theta = 0. \quad [3]$$

- (iii) Use the formula

$$\tan 3\theta = \frac{3 \tan \theta - \tan^3 \theta}{1 - 3 \tan^2 \theta}$$

to find this maximum distance. [4]

- (iv) Draw a sketch of  $C$ . [2]

11 Answer only **one** of the following two alternatives.

**EITHER**

Prove by induction that

$$\sum_{n=1}^N n^3 = \frac{1}{4}N^2(N+1)^2. \quad [5]$$

Use this result, together with the formula for  $\sum_{n=1}^N n^2$ , to show that

$$\sum_{n=1}^N (20n^3 + 36n^2) = N(N+1)(N+3)(5N+2). \quad [3]$$

Let

$$S_N = \sum_{n=1}^N (20n^3 + 36n^2 + \mu n).$$

Find the value of the constant  $\mu$  such that  $S_N$  is of the form  $N^2(N+1)(aN+b)$ , where the constants  $a$  and  $b$  are to be determined. [3]

Show that, for this value of  $\mu$ ,

$$5 + \frac{22}{N} < N^{-4}S_N < 5 + \frac{23}{N},$$

for all  $N \geq 18$ . [3]

**OR**

One of the eigenvalues of the matrix

$$\mathbf{A} = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & -4 & 6 \\ 2 & -4 & 2 \\ -3 & 4 & a \end{pmatrix}$$

is  $-2$ . Find the value of  $a$ . [3]

Another eigenvalue of  $\mathbf{A}$  is  $-5$ . Find eigenvectors  $\mathbf{e}_1$  and  $\mathbf{e}_2$  corresponding to the eigenvalues  $-2$  and  $-5$  respectively. [3]

The linear space spanned by  $\mathbf{e}_1$  and  $\mathbf{e}_2$  is denoted by  $V$ .

(i) Prove that, for any vector  $\mathbf{x}$  belonging to  $V$ , the vector  $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{x}$  also belongs to  $V$ . [4]

(ii) Find a non-zero vector which is perpendicular to every vector in  $V$ , and determine whether it is an eigenvector of  $\mathbf{A}$ . [4]
