- 1 The key study by Grant et al. (2008) treated gambling disorder in one of two double-blind placebo-controlled trials, in a university and treatment centres.
 - (a) (i) Identify the drug used in each trial. [2]
 - (ii) State the duration of each trial. [2]
 - (b) Suggest why placebo-controlled trials were used in this study. [2]
 - (c) Explain **one** strength and **one** weakness of using multiple locations within this study. [4]

 - (a) Outline **one** case study of schizophrenia. [2]
 - (b) Suggest why the data gathered from a person with schizophrenia might **not** be reliable. [2]
 - (c) Explain **two** strengths of using case studies to collect data on schizophrenia. [4]

- 3 From the key study by Becker et al. (2011) on food package design, a pre-test on packaging shape was conducted.
 - (a) Describe the procedure of the pre-test on packaging shape. [4]
 - (b) Suggest **one** effect on the results if the pre-test had **not** been conducted. [2]
 - (c) Explain **one** strength and **one** weakness of conducting studies on packaging shape for food in the entrance hall of a supermarket. [4]
- 4
 - (a) Explain what is meant by the term 'retail atmospherics'. [2]
 - (b) Suggest the effect **one** retail atmospheric might have on shopper ambience. [2]
 - (c) Explain **two** strengths of studying retail atmospherics for the seller (retailer). [4]

- 5 The key study by Bridge et al. (1988) on reducing stress during medical treatment divided the female participants into two experimental groups and one control group.
- (a) (i) Outline the procedure followed by the 'relaxation plus imagery' experimental group. [2]
 - (ii) Outline the experimental design that was used in this study. [2]
 - (b) Suggest **one** problem if a different experimental design was used in this study, other than the one you outlined in part (a)(ii). [2]
 - (c) Explain **one** strength and **one** weakness of using a sample of female participants in studies on reducing stress. [4]
- 6 (a) Outline the methodology used in **one** study on improving adherence in children (e.g. Chaney et al. 2004). [2]
- (b) Suggest **one** ethical guideline that applies to the children in the study you outlined in part (a). [2]
- (c) Explain **two** weaknesses of using parents/guardians to collect data about improving the adherence of children in their care. Do **not** refer to ethics in your answer. [4]

- 7 From the key study by Cuadrado et al. (2008) on women's access to managerial positions:
- (a) (i) State **two** features of the sample of participants used in this study. [2]
 - (ii) Outline what each participant was asked to do after reading the narrative (the description of the supervisor's behaviour). [2]
 - (b) Suggest why Cuadrado et al. used four different versions of the same narrative. [2]
 - (c) Explain **two** strengths of using an experiment to investigate women's access to managerial positions in this study. [4]
- 8 Walton's quality of working life (QWL) has an evaluation scale with eight conditions, including a fair and appropriate salary.
- (a) State **two** question items from the scale that relate to a fair and appropriate salary. [2]
 - (b) Suggest how the reliability of the QWL evaluation scale could be tested. [2]
 - (c) Explain **two** weaknesses of the question items from the QWL evaluation scale. [4]

(iii) Explain **one** reason for your choice of type(s) of data. [2]
