The origins and development of the Cold War

- 3 Read the extract and then answer the question.

The Potsdam Conference should have been a time of celebration.

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Yet not for a long time, not for a dozen years, would Truman concede that he had been naïve at Potsdam – ‘an innocent idealist’ in his own words, dealing with an unscrupulous Russian dictator.

What can you learn from this extract about the interpretation and approach of the historian who wrote it? Use the extract and your knowledge of the Cold War to explain your answer. [40]
