- F: * My presentation today's about the city of Ushuaia, which lies on an island in southern Argentina, in South America.

Ushuaia's unusual name comes from a local language, and you might assume it'd be called 'between two oceans' as the city sits where the Atlantic and Pacific meet. In actual fact, it means something like 'deep bay', which perfectly describes where the so-called 'city at the end of the world' is located.

So what's Ushuaia's climate like? Well, you'd expect it to be extremely cold, given that it's relatively close to Antarctica, but the average temperature remains well above freezing, even in winter. The surrounding sea keeps temperatures higher, and damp air is regularly blown in on south-westerly winds bringing plenty of rain.

Humans have lived in South America for a long time, arriving in this continent an estimated fifteen-thousand years ago. They moved gradually across it, reaching the island on which Ushuaia's situated around ten-thousand years ago, but it wasn't until six-thousand years ago that anyone made Ushuaia their home.

Ushuaia's population grew quickly in the late-nineteenth century. Rumours of gold being discovered there attracted many, but the stories were found to be false, so a mine never appeared. A prison constructed in 1896 was at the heart of the town for many years. The city's port gained great importance in the following century.

These days, Ushuaia supports a wide range of industries, with tourism recently taking over from fishing as the principal source of income, and oil in third place behind these two. Perhaps surprisingly for somewhere so remote, one of the largest electronics factories in Argentina can be found in Ushuaia. Farming's always been a challenge there though, given the lack of suitable land.

Another surprising feature of Ushuaia is its small railway. It's largely used to take visitors to the nearby national park nowadays, although its initial function was to carry trees that had been cut down. These were used in the construction of buildings, as suitable stone was in short supply.

I was lucky enough to visit Ushuaia last year, when it was summer there and winter back home. I had no idea that night only lasted a few hours there. Dawn arrived at around 4 a.m., and it was often still quite light when I went to bed, so you had to stay up late to see the stars. It was worth it, though, as the lack of light pollution means they're really bright.

There were many other things I loved about Ushuaia, primarily its appearance, which is unlike anywhere else I've visited – the buildings are very original, with many being painted bright colours. Residents were very welcoming too, which was great, and there's tons to see if nature's your thing, everything from whale-watching to identifying the many species of birds.

I'd recommend Ushuaia to anyone! **

- F:** * With me today is successful sound engineer, Scott Patterson. Scott, you help create the perfect sound for musicians – what made you choose that profession?
- M:** Well, my aunt's a musician, and she took me to a recording studio when I was 12. I couldn't take my eyes off the guy behind the big recording desk, who was changing the sound of my aunt's guitar as she played – it just seemed like magic. His name's Trent Fawcett and he's actually quite

famous – there's an interesting documentary about him online and interviews with him in various magazines, but I'd already decided it'd be my career by the time I saw them.

F: Did you study sound engineering after leaving school?

M: I did. It was a few years ago so the technology's changed a lot since then, but my teachers had all worked as sound engineers before going into education, so they could tell you anything you needed to know about the profession. If only they'd provided work placements on the course, it would've been perfect.

F: You started working at a live music venue after college. What was your first concert there like?

With all the effort she puts in and praise she's currently getting for the songs she's posted online so far, you'd think she'd have more self-belief.
