M: * I'm Mark, here to tell you about a conservation project I took part in. It was to help restore an old building, called a mill, where wheat was made into flour centuries ago. It hadn't been used for many years so the new owners hired experts to restore it, and I joined a group of volunteers to help them.

Anyway, I've known the building and its location since I was a child, although nowadays there's lots of traffic speeding past! From our farm, we can see the mill in the distance, as there are hardly any trees between us and the building.

I've always thought the building was very attractive. The windows are a really unusual shape – they're circular, which I love. The high roof is painted red, so there's a contrast with the walls, which are all completely white, reflecting the sun.

I was really keen to get involved with the conservation project. I wasn't skilled enough to fix anything in the building, but I knew it'd be dirty inside, so I could've tackled that. But instead, I was asked to find information online about how it once looked inside. It was absolutely fascinating to see it being restored.

The experts brought in to run the project took the building's old metal lamps away and got them working, then re-installed them. And several of us were in the building to see them make the original stone floors look as good as new. I was away when they fixed the wooden stairs inside the building, though.

Buildings like this one needed power. Similar structures often had wooden sails, which turned when the wind blew – and the power they generated operated the machines inside. But this one had an old water wheel attached, which was repaired. These days, it works well enough to run everything! Solar panels were considered at one point, to get energy from the sun but it was decided to keep the original feature instead.

During the project, I was also asked to record the work everyone was doing. I took lots of photos, although they failed to show people's enthusiasm for the work, somehow. So then I did some quick drawings – and I was really proud of what I produced. I'd wanted to paint the scenes, too, but that would've meant carrying too much equipment.

Restoring the building was a long process. It was 2019 when the project was initially discussed, but it wasn't till 2023 that the building welcomed its first paying visitors. And in 2024, record numbers of people came to see it.

Anyway, I recently went back to visit the building. The new owners were selling goods made from the flour produced in the mill. I'd hoped to get some biscuits, but they'd sold out, so I had to be satisfied with some cake – but promised to return for some bread very soon! **

- M** * I'm talking to Jane Evans, who recently bought a boat – and has since done lots of solo sailing! Jane, tell us your first impressions of the boat.
- F** Well, I live close to the sea in the UK, and this boat, a classic sailing yacht, had been in a nearby harbour for months. It'd been repainted – and it turned out it needed extensive work to fix it too, although I didn't know that at the time! It was a bargain, anyway, so I agreed to buy it. The only thing was, my sailing qualifications were fairly basic. But it seemed just the kind of boat I could handle by myself, and I was soon ready to set off.

- M** So where did you decide to go first?
- F** Through a really busy sailing area along the coast! I knew the boat'd cope well but I wanted the opportunity to push myself to see how I'd manage out on the open water. And luckily, I got through it without crashing into anyone! And I later realised that wherever I stopped, people would come and admire the boat, so I began to stop deliberately in places where I knew that'd happen!
- M** But then you had to return home at the end of your trip?
