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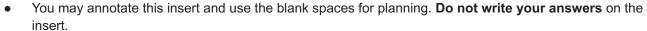



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Source 1

In many parts of the world, governments are introducing more tests of students' achievement in schools. Since 2000, eight countries in Europe have introduced national tests for students in primary and secondary schools.

In the United States, the government spends \$1.7 billion on testing students. Most students take about 112 tests between the ages of 5 and 19; about 8 tests per year. This takes about 25 hours every school year. Japan, Mexico, and South Africa also have significant external testing of school students.

It is right that students work hard. However, I believe that motivation comes from the joy of learning and exploring new ideas. Schools should be places where students have fun and learn together.

Tests often become barriers to learning. A research study in the UK in 2018 showed that teachers often 'teach to the test' and that important subjects are neglected. Active learning of practical skills for the future is replaced by simple recall of knowledge to pass tests. As the United Nations points out, schools need to develop skills for the future and lifelong learning.

It is important for schools to provide a supportive, caring environment where confidence in learning is encouraged. Too much pressure from testing leads to stress and mental health issues. For example, depression in students is more common in countries with higher levels of school testing.

Finland, where there is less testing, has some of the best levels of school achievement in the world.

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
