Answer Question 1.

Research methods

1 Read Source A and then answer the questions below.

Source A

In the United States Barbara Ehrenreich used covert participant observation to research how working class people are able to live on low wages. For several months Ehrenreich left her middle-class home and lived and worked with people in low-wage jobs. She found work in four different cities in the United States. Her various jobs included being a waitress, a cleaner, a care home assistant and a shop worker. She wrote down her experiences at the end of each day. For her research Ehrenreich experienced trying to live on a low wage to pay for her food, clothing, transportation and shelter.

Using covert participant observation allowed Ehrenreich to gain a first-hand, qualitative and in-depth understanding of the difficult lives of low-wage workers. Her conclusions were:

- low-wage workers cannot afford basic necessities without working in more than one job
- low-wage workers are often socially controlled through random searches of their bags and drug testing
- managers had negative attitudes to low-wage workers based on class or racial prejudice
- medical treatment and childcare are too expensive for low-wage workers.
