1. (a) Find the first four terms in the expansion, in ascending powers of $x$, of

$$
(1-2 x)^{-\frac{1}{2}}, \quad|2 x|<1,
$$

giving each term in its simplest form.

(b) Hence write down the first four terms in the expansion, in ascending powers of $x$, of

$$
\begin{equation*}
(100-200 x)^{-\frac{1}{2}}, \quad|2 x|<1 \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

2. $\mathrm{f}(x)=2 x^{3}-x^{2}+a x+b$, where $a$ and $b$ are constants.

It is given that $(x-2)$ is a factor of $\mathrm{f}(x)$.
When $\mathrm{f}(x)$ is divided by $(x+1)$, the remainder is 6 .
Find the value of $a$ and the value of $b$.
3. A circle $C$ has radius $\sqrt{ } 5$ and has its centre at the point with coordinates $(4,3)$.
(a) Prove that an equation of the circle $C$ is $x^{2}+y^{2}-8 x-6 y+20=0$.

The line $l$, with equation $y=2 x$, is a tangent to the circle $C$.
(c) Find the coordinates of the point where the line $l$ touches $C$.

$$
\mathrm{f}(x)=\left(x^{2}+1\right) \ln x, \quad x>0 .
$$

(a) Use differentiation to find the value of $\mathrm{f}^{\prime}(x)$ at $x=\mathrm{e}$, leaving your answer in terms of e .
(b) Find the exact value of $\int_{1}^{e} \mathrm{f}(x) \mathrm{d} x$.

$$
\mathrm{f}(x)=\frac{9+4 x^{2}}{9-4 x^{2}}, \quad x \neq \pm \frac{3}{2}
$$

(a) Find the values of the constants $A, B$ and $C$ such that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{f}(x)=A+\frac{B}{3+2 x}+\frac{C}{3-2 x}, \quad x \neq \pm \frac{3}{2} . \tag{4}
\end{equation*}
$$

(b) Hence find the exact value of

$$
\begin{equation*}
\int_{-1}^{1} \frac{9+4 x^{2}}{9-4 x^{2}} \mathrm{~d} x \tag{5}
\end{equation*}
$$

6. The rate of decrease of the concentration of a drug in the bloodstream is proportional to the concentration $C$ of the drug which is present at that time. The time $t$ is measured in hours from the administration of the drug and $C$ is measured in micrograms per litre.
(a) Show that the process is described by the differential equation $\frac{\mathrm{d} C}{\mathrm{~d} t}=-k C$, explaining why $k$ is a positive constant.
(b) Find the general solution of the differential equation, in the form $C=\mathrm{f}(t)$.

After 4 hours, the concentration of the drug in the bloodstream is reduced to $10 \%$ of its starting value $C_{0}$.
(c) Find the exact value of $k$.
7. The points $A$ and $B$ have position vectors $\mathbf{i}-\mathbf{j}+p \mathbf{k}$ and $7 \mathbf{i}+q \mathbf{j}+6 \mathbf{k}$ respectively, where $p$ and $q$ are constants.

The line $l_{1}$, passing through the points $A$ and $B$, has equation

$$
\mathbf{r}=9 \mathbf{i}+7 \mathbf{j}+7 \mathbf{k}+\lambda(2 \mathbf{i}+2 \mathbf{j}+\mathbf{k}), \text { where } \lambda \text { is a parameter } .
$$

(a) Find the value of $p$ and the value of $q$.
(b) Find a unit vector in the direction of $\overrightarrow{A B}$.

A second line $l_{2}$ has vector equation

$$
\mathbf{r}=3 \mathbf{i}+2 \mathbf{j}+3 \mathbf{k}+\mu(2 \mathbf{i}+\mathbf{j}+2 \mathbf{k}), \text { where } \mu \text { is a parameter. }
$$

(c) Find the cosine of the acute angle between $l_{1}$ and $l_{2}$.
(d) Find the coordinates of the point where the two lines meet.

## Figure 1



The curve shown in Figure 1 has parametric equations

$$
x=a \cos 3 t, \quad y=a \sin t, \quad 0 \leq t \leq \frac{\pi}{6} .
$$

The curve meets the axes at points $A$ and $B$ as shown in Figure 1.
The straight line shown is part of the tangent to the curve at the point $A$.
Find, in terms of $a$,
(a) an equation of the tangent at $A$,
(b) an exact value for the area of the finite region between the curve, the tangent at $A$ and the $x$-axis, shown shaded in Figure 1.
