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General Marking Guidance

- All candidates must receive the same treatment. Examiners must mark the first candidate in exactly the same way as they mark the last.
- Mark schemes should be applied positively. Candidates must be rewarded for what they have shown they can do rather than penalised for omissions.
- Examiners should mark according to the mark scheme not according to their perception of where the grade boundaries may lie.
- There is no ceiling on achievement. All marks on the mark scheme should be used appropriately.
- All the marks on the mark scheme are designed to be awarded. Examiners should always award full marks if deserved, i.e. if the answer matches the mark scheme. Examiners should also be prepared to award zero marks if the candidate's response is not worthy of credit according to the mark scheme.
- Where some judgement is required, mark schemes will provide the principles by which marks will be awarded and exemplification may be limited.
- When examiners are in doubt regarding the application of the mark scheme to a candidate's response, the team leader must be consulted.
- Crossed out work should be marked UNLESS the candidate has replaced it with an alternative response.

21	<p>The only correct answer is C.</p> <p>A is not correct as the text states that she spends a lot of time on the road for her job and this is often by herself.</p> <p>B is not correct because the text states that Mary has learned that solo travel is easier than you might think, therefore she has not always thought it would be easy.</p> <p>D is not correct because it states in the text that Mary is addicted to solo travel but there is no reference to whether she now only goes on holiday alone.</p>	1 (AO1c)
22	<p>The only correct answer is A.</p> <p>B is not correct because the text does mention people having lists of places they want to visit but not that people should make lists.</p> <p>C is not correct as the text states that people have different travel plans.</p> <p>D is not correct because the text does not refer to the financial cost of travelling with others only that time is wasted waiting for others to travel with you.</p>	1 (AO1c)
23	<p>The only correct answer is C.</p> <p>A is not correct because Mary feels that it is not important how far people travel, only that they spend time alone on the road.</p> <p>B is not correct because the text states that travel time gives you the time to enjoy your own company and makes no reference to this being boring.</p> <p>D is not correct because Mary states that she interacts with strangers differently when she is away but makes no reference to this process becoming easier.</p>	1 (AO1c)

24	<p>The only correct answer is D.</p> <p>A is not correct because even though the text mentions language differences it does not refer to learning language phrases.</p> <p>B is not correct because travellers are told to research local cafes to meet people, not research the food of the local area.</p> <p>C is not correct because the text does not include any recommendations for accommodation.</p>	1 (AO1c)
