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General Marking Guidance

- All candidates must receive the same treatment. Examiners must mark the first candidate in exactly the same way as they mark the last.
- Mark schemes should be applied positively. Candidates must be rewarded for what they have shown they can do rather than penalised for omissions.
- Examiners should mark according to the mark scheme not according to their perception of where the grade boundaries may lie.
- There is no ceiling on achievement. All marks on the mark scheme should be used appropriately.
- All the marks on the mark scheme are designed to be awarded. Examiners should always award full marks if deserved, i.e. if the answer matches the mark scheme. Examiners should also be prepared to award zero marks if the candidate's response is not worthy of credit according to the mark scheme.
- Where some judgement is required, mark schemes will provide the principles by which marks will be awarded and exemplification may be limited.
- When examiners are in doubt regarding the application of the mark scheme to a candidate's response, the team leader must be consulted.
- Crossed out work should be marked UNLESS the candidate has replaced it with an alternative response.

	C is not correct as the text does not make any reference to educating the next generation, only preserving the environment and culture of Palau for the next generation.	
	D is not correct as the text does not make reference to pledges for residents, only for tourists.

	B is not correct as the text states tourists will be encouraged to look after the delicate nature in Iceland, but does not make reference to how this will be done.	
	C is not correct as the text clearly states that when tourists arrive they are encouraged to take a pledge; there is no mention of them receiving a talk about safety at this point.	
	D is not correct as the text states tourists taking the Icelandic Pledge will hopefully form an 'army' of people who know how to look after the country's delicate nature, not that the army will look after them.

	B is not correct as the text makes reference to the problem of where motorhomes are parked, but not the fact that more people are using them.	
	D is not correct as the text states what is covered in the video for tourists, but does not state that residents have any issues with it.

	A is not correct because the text states that tourists are not required to sign a pledge.	
	B is not correct because the text states that tourists may have to pay fines of up to 500 euros but does not say these are on-the-spot fines.	
	C is not correct because the text talks about tourist behaviour being monitored in popular tourist spots and not residential areas.
