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General Marking Guidance

- All candidates must receive the same treatment.
 Examiners must mark the first candidate in exactly the same way as they mark the last.
- Mark schemes should be applied positively. Candidates must be rewarded for what they have shown they can do rather than penalised for omissions.
- Examiners should mark according to the mark scheme not according to their perception of where the grade boundaries may lie.
- There is no ceiling on achievement. All marks on the mark scheme should be used appropriately.
- All the marks on the mark scheme are designed to be awarded. Examiners should always award full marks if deserved, i.e. if the answer matches the mark scheme. Examiners should also be prepared to award zero marks if the candidate's response is not worthy of credit according to the mark scheme.
- Where some judgement is required, mark schemes will provide the principles by which marks will be awarded and exemplification may be limited.
- When examiners are in doubt regarding the application of the mark scheme to a candidate's response, the team leader must be consulted.
- Crossed out work should be marked UNLESS the candidate has replaced it with an alternative response.

(3 + 1 marks - for knowledge and example) (2 x 4 marks)	8

(Other approaches are possible and should be rewarded accordingly.) 	6

10 (b)	 Answers are likely to refer to such effects as: Belief in the oneness of Allah (Tawhid) encourages the unity of Muslims. The mosque collects and distributes Zakah on behalf of the whole community. Zakah unites rich and poor in a common purpose. Zakah helps to overcome differences of race and culture. Zakah acts as a curb on selfishness and focuses on the worship of Allah. It is helpful on the Day of Reckoning – Allah repays the giver many times over (1 mark for basic point, 2 for development.) (Other approaches are possible and should be rewarded accordingly.) 	6

(Other approaches are possible and should be rewarded accordingly.) 	6

12 (a)	Answers are likely to state such points as: 1. It means "purity from all sins and mistakes"/ otherwise Muslims may be led to do wrong by following someone who is unreliable. 2. He is endowed with perfect human attributes, such as bravery, patience and intelligence/ otherwise, he is not fit to lead people and administer the affairs of the world. (2 x 2 marks)	4

12 (b)	 Answers are likely to give such explanations as: They have been proved not to be what was originally revealed, e.g., the Torah and the Gospels. These books have been changed by adding to them, so that most or all of them were compiled after their time by the followers of Musa and Isa. (2 x 2 marks) 	4

12 (c)	Answers are likely to produce such suggestions as:	
	 He continued and completed prophetic themes and characteristics. He was 'the Prophet of the nations', foretold by Isa and by holy writings. His moral qualities surpassed those who preceded him ("the apex of humanity"). The Qur'an was revealed to him. His message was universal. The finality of his message: no other was needed after him. (1 mark for simple point made; 2 for developed answer.) (Other approaches are possible and should be rewarded accordingly.) 	6

12 (d)	 Answers are likely to give such points as: He was not superhuman. He had no supernatural knowledge. He had no miraculous powers of the sort that Musa displayed. 	4
