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General Marking Guidance

- All candidates must receive the same treatment.
 Examiners must mark the first candidate in exactly the same way as they mark the last.
- Mark schemes should be applied positively. Candidates must be rewarded for what they have shown they can do rather than penalised for omissions.
- Examiners should mark according to the mark scheme not according to their perception of where the grade boundaries may lie.
- There is no ceiling on achievement. All marks on the mark scheme should be used appropriately.
- All the marks on the mark scheme are designed to be awarded. Examiners should always award full marks if deserved, i.e. if the answer matches the mark scheme. Examiners should also be prepared to award zero marks if the candidate's response is not worthy of credit according to the mark scheme.
- Where some judgement is required, mark schemes will provide the principles by which marks will be awarded and exemplification may be limited.
- When examiners are in doubt regarding the application of the mark scheme to a candidate's response, the team leader must be consulted.
- Crossed out work should be marked UNLESS the candidate has replaced it with an alternative response.

Suddenly he knew the words. He recited Surah 96.1-5"Read; In the name of thy lord, who createth, createth man from a clot" (indicate gist) Filled with confusion and doubt, he left the cave but heard the voice again. Told he was the messenger of Allah, the one true God. Returned home, shaking with fear. Khadijah comforted and reassured him. Took him to her Christian relative, Waraqa, who confirmed the validity of the calling. (Any eight valid points) 	8

It ensures the passage of the faith from one generation to another. Muslims believe that the 'Night of Power' is 'better than one thousand months'. Deputations from distant tribes arrived in Madinah: many accepted Islam. He became less tolerant of the Christians, regarding them as polytheists. He made a last pilgrimage to Makkah. (Credit reference to final Sermon). Plans for Syrian expedition were shelved as illness overtook him. Took up residence in Aishah's house and died there shortly afterwards. The completion of the revelation of the Qur'an Asking Abu Bakr to lead the prayers	6

6 (b)	 Answers are likely to refer to such explanations as:- Muslims are required to observe the Five Pillars – witness, prayer, fasting, zakat and hajj – without which, their faith is invalid. Thus Muslims are wary of the Day of Judgement. Universal brotherhood is essential if the faith is to survive. The property and persons of others must be respected at all times. Thus Muslims practice peace, the very meaning of Islam. Everyone is equal in the sight of Allah. No person is superior to another, except by taqwa and good deeds. Thus Muslims show respect and kindness to non-Muslims. 	6

He practised what he preached: so he is honoured today throughout the Muslim world. He passed on the teachings of a sacred book, which is a trustworthy guide for all Muslims. He was brave in battle but observed and taught the proper behaviour towards one's enemies as a means of winning them over. He particularly cared about the most vulnerable in society: a lasting legacy. He established a stable state He taught the rights of women. 3x2 (1 mark for basic point; 2 if developed.) Alternative qualities- humility, justice, leadership, generosity and courage 	4

	Answers are likely to refer to such explanations as: • Abu Bakr: He assembled the Qur'an (collected by his secretary), brought back tribes which broke away and carried the attack to the outside world. He restored peace and order over the vast peninsula. • Umar: Much of his reign spent in warfare. He showed his administrative skills by dividing the empire into provinces under able governors. Social advances — police, jails, public treasuries, etc. built roads, bridges, mosques and dwelling-houses. • Uthman: Muslim Empire spread west across North Africa and east to the boundary of China and the Indus Valley. Urged by the inhabitants of Kufa to head a rebellion, he reached Karbala, a tiny spot in the desert. Short of water and after a final vigil of prayer, he faced his enemies on 10th Muharram. A massacre followed; Husayn was decapitated and his body trampled by horses. 	4

	 Examples: Obey the Divine commandments (the Five Pillars). Put the principles of Islam into practice. Fight "the greater Jihad". Influence others (both Muslim and non-Muslim) to choose the path of righteousness. Continue to show respect to the descendants of the Prophet (3x2)
