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General notes:

- The following paragraphs are to be considered suggestions, rather than prescriptions, *i.e.* all points made by candidates to be marked on their merits.
- Any attempt to answer should be acknowledged as such; that should be followed especially in translation, when some candidates depart from literal in favour of a more poetic rendition, faithful, of course, to the original idea.
- The second use of the same figure of speech to answer a style question should be penalized, by not being taken into account: *e.g.* double mention of alliteration.

Elegiac and Lyric poetry

- 1. (a) Where: here / Rome [1 mark]; Bithynia / Asia [1 mark]. When: now / at the time of Catullus's return [1 mark]; then / at the time of his service [1 mark].
 - (b) He could not (even) afford / buy [1 mark] a bedstead / lectica [1 mark] old / with a broken leg [1 mark]. Accept [1 mark] any reference to litter-bearers, carriers or lecticarii if set in context.
 - (c) *cinaeda*, impudent or the like [1 mark], insulsa, silly, insipid [1 mark], molesta, annoying [1 mark]. Accept both Latin terms and English translations.
 - (d) Award [3 marks] for a perfect translation or with only one minor error; [2 marks] for two minor errors or one major one; [1 mark] for two major errors or three or more minor errors; otherwise no mark.
 - (e) He is embarassed, petulant, bad-tempered, rude or the like [1 mark] because has been caught lying, is poor, cannot show off [1 mark].

- 2. (a) Award [3 marks] for a perfect translation or with only one minor error; [2 marks] for two minor errors or one major one; [1 mark] for two major errors or three or more minor errors; otherwise no mark.
 - (b) Elderly (or similar) [1 mark]. maturo propior funeri [1 mark]; vetula/m [1 mark].
 - (c) A Bacchante/priestess/follower of Bacchus/Dyonisus [1 mark]; roused/excited/stirred up [1 mark] by the beat of the drum [1 mark].
 - (d) Spinning [1 mark] occupation fit for old women [1 mark].
 - e) [1 mark] (up to four) for any of the following points:
 - mingle/dance/play with maidens/virgins
 - storm (or similar) young men's homes
 - take pleasure in/play citharas/citherns/guitars/lutes
 - dress up/embellish/decorate herself with roses.

Epic

- **3.** (a) The Sibyl [1 mark] ordering Aeneas to bury [1 mark] a body [1 mark] tainting/contaminating the fleet [1 mark].
 - (b) Rousing men [1 mark]; kindling war [1 mark].
 - (c) Award [3 marks] for a perfect translation or with only one minor error; [2 marks] for two minor errors or one major one; [1 mark] for two major errors or three or more minor errors; otherwise no mark.
 - (d) The golden branch/bough [1 mark] brought by Aeneas or according to the will of the gods/Fate [1 mark]; Charon [1 mark]; living persons/Hercules/Theseus/Orpheus (accept any) had already entered the Underworld/had brought it [1 mark].
 - (e) Judge only on length of syllables. [1 mark] for each error-free line.

- **4.** (a) Judge only on length of syllables. [1 mark] for each error-free line.
 - (b) Clear (or similar) [1 mark]; contrast with graveolens/stinking (of Avernus) [1 mark].
 - (c) Award up to [2 marks] for relevant examples, and up to [2 marks] for their names (if figures of speech) or explanation of the way they work. Examples may include the following (but accept other answers): alliteration (viri ... venere volantes ... viridi; quae ... ferant, quo ... pergant; pergant, pascire ... prodire; servare sequentum); chiasmus (pinguem dives ... ramus humum); reference to colours (viridi ... solo; opaca; discolor ... refulsit); apostrophe (este duces; tuque, o ... parens).
 - (d) Award [3 marks] for a perfect translation or with only one minor error; [2 marks] for two minor errors or one major one; [1 mark] for two major errors or three or more minor errors; otherwise no mark.
 - (e) In the Underworld [1 mark], among the souls of the dead because of unhappy love [1 mark]. Aeneas shaken/shocked/upset (concussus) [1 mark] by the news of Dido's misfortunes (casu iniquo) [1 mark] (one mark only out of the last two if no reference to the Latin is made).

Historiography

- 5. (a) Acritical acceptance of tradition [1 mark]; no explicit distinction between myth and historical events [1 mark]; moral lesson of history (Aeneas and Anthenor spared because of their justness/pity) [1 mark].
 - (b) Well [1 mark]; right of hospitality [1 mark]; they wanted peace [1 mark]; they wanted to give Helen back [1 mark].
 - (c) In the Adriatic sea / in the land of the Euganei [1 mark]; in the land of Laurentum [1 mark].
 - (d) Had been chased away from Paphlagonia (because of a revolution) [1 mark]; had lost the king Pylamene [1 mark]; who had been killed at Troy [1 mark].
 - (e) Award [3 marks] for a perfect translation or with only one minor error; [2 marks] for two minor errors or one major one; [1 mark] for two major errors or three or more minor errors; otherwise no mark.

- **6.** (a) Ascanius born of Lavinia [1 mark] in Italy [1 mark]. Or: born of Creusa [1 mark] in Troy/Ilium [1 mark].
 - (b) Events narrated are remote in time [1 mark]; possible bias in one of the two traditions being reported by the gens Iulia as more favourable to themselves [1 mark].
 - (c) Consecration of the altar [1 mark] to Heracles [1 mark] after his retrieval of the cows [1 mark] stolen by Cacus [1 mark]. Accept alternative grounded answers, awarding [1 mark] for every correct piece of evidence.
 - (d) Award [3 marks] for a perfect translation or with only one minor error; [2 marks] for two minor errors or one major one; [1 mark] for two major errors or three or more minor errors; otherwise no mark.
 - (e) *virtus/virtute*: personal courage/bravery/excellence [1 mark]; sua fata: destiny/fate/will of the gods [1 mark].

Letters

- 7. (a) Pliny the elder [1 mark]; uncle [1 mark]; [1 mark] (up to two) for any two aspects such as: sobriety in food and sleep, industriousness, open-mindedness, fondness of culture, constancy, impatience, parsimoniousness, attentiveness, determination.
 - (b) Make extracts/selections from a book/writings [1 mark]; because there is no book so bad that no part of it can be good [1 mark].
 - (c) Private baths: did not work/study/rested [1 mark]; public baths: listened to a lector or dictated to a scribe [1 mark].
 - (d) Award [3 marks] for a perfect translation or one with only one minor error; [2 marks] for two minor errors or or one major error; [1 mark] for two major errors or three or four minor errors. Otherwise no mark.
 - (e) A friend makes a reader repeat some lines [1 mark]; this is a waste of time [1 mark]. The author is walking [1 mark] when he could be transported and devote that time to study [1 mark].

- **8.** (a) He was dear/valuable/precious (to his parents) [1 mark] not only as a son [1 mark] but also because of his (moral) excellence [1 mark] and modesty/dignity [1 mark] (or: no less because of his excellence than for being their son). Award only [1 mark] for "other reasons" without further specification.
 - (b) Award [3 marks] for a perfect translation or one with only one minor error; [2 marks] for two minor errors or or one major error; [1 mark] for two major errors or three or four minor errors. Otherwise no mark.
 - (c) Award [1 mark] (up to three) for any point such as: she hides their son's death/funeral; she pretends he is still alive/(even) better; she lies to her husband about their son's health; she does not shed tears in front of him.
 - (d) praeclarus-um: splendid/remarkable/famous/excellent etc. [1 mark]; immortalis-em: immortal/undying [1 mark]; divinus-am: divine [1 mark]. Accept endings as given in text. Do not accept nouns (gloria, aeternitas).
 - (e) Concealing son's death [1 mark] because there was no reward of immortality or glory / nobody knew what she was doing [1 mark].

Satire

- 9. (a) In Rome [1 mark] the son of free-born parents [1 mark] is inferior to (has to give the wall/the best side) [1 mark] a rich man's slave [1 mark].
 - (b) (Publius Cornelius Scipio) received (the statue of) the Idean deity/Cybele [1 mark]; (Numa) (second) king of Rome/founder of Roman religion [1 mark]; (Lucius Caecilius Metellus) saved (the statue of) Minerva from her temple in flames [1 mark]. Proper names not required.
 - (c) Award [3 marks] for a perfect translation or with only one minor error; [2 marks] for two minor errors or one major one; [1 mark] for two major errors or three or more minor errors; otherwise no mark.
 - (d) He is believed [1 mark] to contemn gods and thunderbolts [1 mark]; the gods (themselves) forgive him [1 mark].
 - (e) The amount of money [1 mark] he keeps in his strong-box [1 mark].

- **10.** (a) [2 marks] (up to four) for any of the following pairs:
 - Codrus has nothing (nil habuit); Asturicus has a grand house (magna domus) [2 marks].
 - Codrus is unfortunate/poor (infelix); Persicus is very rich (lautissimus) [2 marks].
 - Codrus is given neither food (cibo) nor a shelter (hospitio tectoque); Persicus is given better and more things (meliora ac plura) [2 marks].

Accept any other sensible suggestions, remembering that Asturicus and Persicus could also be the same person (Juvenal's text is not clear on this point).

- (b) Despair/misery/(utter) desolation [1 mark]; having nothing and having lost that whole nothing [1 mark]. Accept similar reasonable answers.
- (c) Judge only on length of syllables. [1 mark] for each error-free line.
- (d) Euphranor and Polyclitus Greek artists [1 mark]; reference to the treasures of the Asian shrines [1 mark]; Persicus oriental name [1 mark].
- (e) Having set fire (incenderit) [1 mark] to his own house (suas aedes) [1 mark]; being childless (orbus) [1 mark] and very rich (lautissimus) [1 mark].

Award [3 marks] for a correct answer, or for an answer with no more than one minor error (tense, number, etc.). Answers with two or three minor errors or one major error should be awarded [2 marks]. Answers with two major errors (or four minor errors) award [1 mark]. Otherwise, no mark should be awarded.
