## Option A - Vergil

## Extract 1 Vergil, Aeneid 12.725-741

1. (a) Award [3] if the meaning has been fully communicated and vocabulary and grammar are rendered correctly. Award [2] if the meaning has been communicated and vocabulary and grammar are rendered adequately despite inaccuracies. Award [1] if the meaning has not been communicated adequately and vocabulary and grammar are not rendered adequately. Award [ 0$]$ if the work does not reach a standard described by the descriptors above.
(b) He leapt forward [1]; he rose up [1] and struck [1].
(c) Mark only for length of syllables. Award [1] per line if all correct; [0] otherwise.
(d) Turnus in haste (praecipitem) [1] forgot to bring own sword (mucrone relicto) [1]; he took that of Metiscus/his charioteer (ferrum rapuisse Metisci / aurigae) [1] which served him well for a time (id diu suffecit) or while the Trojans were fleeing (dum terga dabant Teucri) [1].
(e) His sword burst into fragments (dissiluit) [1] that lay gleaming (resplendent fragmina) [1] on the ground/sand (harena) [1].

## Option A - Vergil

## Extract 2 Vergil, Aeneid 12.758-773

2. (a) Fleeing [1], he chastized all the Rutulians [1], naming each one [1] and demanding his sword [1].
(b) Aeneas threatened immediate death (praesens exitium or mortem) [1] to anyone who came near (si quisquam adeat) [1].
(c) Award [1] each up to [2] for any relevant point of discussion supported by the Latin text, such as:

- alliteration (eg terret trementis, petuntur praemia)
- enjambment (petunt/praemia, minatur/exitium)
- contrast (levia aut ludicra with vita et sanguine)
- repetition (minatur, minitans).
(d) It was sacred to Faunus [1], an olive tree [1] with bitter leaves [1].
(e) When saved from the sea (servati ex undis) [1] they would hang gifts (figere dona) [1] and votive garments (votas suspendere vestes) [1] for the Laurentine god/Faunus (Laurenti divo). [1]


## Option B - History

## Extract 3 Caesar, De Bello Gallico 7.77.1-5

3. (a) The day had passed (praeterita die) [1]; on which reinforcements were expected (qua auxilia exspectaverant [1]; their food was gone (consumpto omni frumento) [1]; they lacked information (inscii) [1].
(b) Some counseled surrender [1]; others counseled an attack [1]; Critognatus gave a speech of remarkable/abominable cruelty [1].
(c) Award [1] up to [2] for relevant details about the location of the Averni, using modern or ancient references, such as: their capital was Gergovia or near modern Gergovie; in the area known today as Provence; in the area that would later become Gallia Narbonensis; in the Auvergne region of France. Do not accept general references such as "in France".
(d) Award [3] if the meaning has been fully communicated and vocabulary and grammar are rendered correctly. Award [2] if the meaning has been communicated and vocabulary and grammar are rendered adequately despite inaccuracies. Award [1] if the meaning has not been communicated adequately and vocabulary and grammar are not rendered adequately. Award [0] if the work does not reach a standard described by the descriptors above.
(e) To be unable to endure hunger/scarcity (inopiam ferre non posse) [1]; is weakness (mollitia) [1]; not virtue/courage (non virtus) [1]. Accept similar responses based on the same Latin quotation.

## Option B - History

## Extract 4 Caesar, De Bello Gallico 7.79

4. (a) He reached Alesia [1]; seized the hilltop [1]; halted near the Roman camp [1].
(b) The cavalry left the encampment (equitatu ex castris educto) [1] and filled the plain (planitiem complent) [1]; and the infantry were posted on higher ground (pedestres copias in locis superioribus constituunt [1].
(c) It extended in length [1]; for three miles [1].
(d) Alesia commands a view of the plain (Alesia despectus in campum) [1]; they came together (concurrunt) [1]; they congratulated each other (fit gratulatio) [1]; and became joyful (ad laetitiam excitantur) [1].
(e) Award [1] up to [3] for any of the following: They brought out their forces; bridged the defensive trenches (or similar, ie "they filled up the ditch"); took up position / lined up in front of the town; and prepared to attack.

## Option C - Love poetry

## Extract 5 Catullus, Carmina 62.56-66

5. (a) Award [3] if the meaning has been fully communicated and vocabulary and grammar are rendered correctly. Award [2] if the meaning has been communicated and vocabulary and grammar are rendered adequately despite inaccuracies. Award [1] if the meaning has not been communicated adequately and vocabulary and grammar are not rendered adequately. Award [ 0$]$ if the work does not reach a standard described by the descriptors above.
(b) Mark only for length of syllables. Award [1] per line if all correct; [0] otherwise.
(c) She was given to him by her father [1]; and her mother [1]; and must obey them [1]. Accept "that he is a great man" or similar (tali coniuge).
(d) Her virginity belongs $1 / 3$ or partly to her [1], 1/3 or partly to her father [1] and $1 / 3$ or partly to her mother [1]. Accept a combination of the second and third points [1] (ie, " $2 / 3$ belongs to her parents") and her parents have given their rights to the husband [1].
(e) Award [1] each up to [2] for any relevant point of discussion supported by the Latin text; and [1] up to [2] for a credible effect, such as:

- apostrophe of the young woman (virgo) highlights the exhortations that will follow
- alliteration (cum dote dederunt) emphasizes finality of the statement
- repetition of Hymen/hymnic formula emphasizes the sacred context of the exhortations
- asyndeton (tertia, tertia, tertia) emphasizes the young woman's diminished legal rights over her own body.


## Option C - Love poetry

## Extract 6 Horace, Odes 1.5

6. (a) A perfumed (liquidis odoribus, or perfusus) [1] young man is trying to persuade/force her (puer urget) [1]; among roses (in rosa) [1]; in a grotto (sub antro) [1].
(b) He will bemoan (flebit) [1]; the god's broken faith (fidem mutatos deos) [1]; and will be amazed (emirabitur) [1] at the rough seas (aequora aspera) [1].
(c) He thinks Pyrrha is golden (te aurea) [1]; he hopes she will always be available (semper vacuam) [1]; he hopes she will be always loving (semper amabilem) [1].
(d) Because she gleams/shines in their opinions [1] only because they have not experienced her [1]. Accept similar, relevant points of discussion.
(e) Sailors who survive shipwrecks [1] dedicate their clothes to Neptune [1].

## Option E - Social criticism

## Extract 7 Horace, Epodes 16.23-41

7. (a) Why delay departure [1] when there are good omens [1].
(b) It is forbidden to return (redire sit nefas) [1]; before rocks float (renarint or levata) [1].
(c) The Po River flows in the north of Italy [1] but Mt. Matinus is a promontory of the southern Appennines [1]; the Appennines are a mountain range [1] as high as 9500 ft above sea level [1]. Accept other analyses that demonstrate understanding of the adynata.
(d) Tigers will desire/submit to deer (tigris subsidere cervis) [1]; doves will mate with raptors (adulteretur columba miluo) [1]; cattle will not fear lions (nec timeant armenta leones) [1]; goats will love the sea (amet hircus aequora) [1].
(e) Award [3] if the meaning has been fully communicated and vocabulary and grammar are rendered correctly. Award [2] if the meaning has been communicated and vocabulary and grammar are rendered adequately despite inaccuracies. Award [1] if the meaning has not been communicated adequately and vocabulary and grammar are not rendered adequately. Award [0] if the work does not reach a standard described by the descriptors above.

## Option E - Social criticism

## Extract 8 Horace, Satires 1.6.81-99

8. (a) He was a guardian [1]; incorruptible [1]; and took Horace to his teachers or had oversight of his teachers (or similar) [1].
(b) By shameful action [1] and by slander [1]. Accept other appropriate interpretations of opprobrio and turpi.
(c) Mark only for length of syllables. Award [1] per line if all correct; [0] otherwise.
(d) If nature required us (si natura iuberet) [1]; to select other parents later in life (aevum peractum alios legere) [1]; who suited our pride (ad fastum) [1]; he would be content with his current parents (meis contentus) [1].
(e) Award [1] each up to [2] for any relevant point of discussion supported by the Latin text; and [1] up to [2] for a credible effect, such as:

- asyndeton/contrast (demens, sanus) emphasizes the different perceptions of parentage
- chiasmus ( magna dolo ... suo pars) highlights Horace's disgust at disowning parents
- enjambment (coactor / mercedes sequerer) emphasizes the commercial life of his father.

## Option G - Villains

## Extract 9 Vergil, Aeneid 10.702-718

9. (a) He was the same age as Paris (aequalem or una nocte) [1]; and his friend/companion (comitem) [1]; born to Theano and Amycus (Theano Amyco dedit) [1].
(b) Mark only for length of syllables. Award [1] per line if all correct; [0] otherwise.
(c) Because forested Mt. Vesulus [1] had protected it [1] and the Laurentine marsh(es) [1] and it had been nourished by the forest (or similar) [1].
(d) Just as the hunters stay far back from the nets [1] and taunt the boar with spears [1] so too the Trojans do not engage Mezentius [1] but throw spears and taunts [1].
(e) Award [1] up to [2] for any of the following: he feints in all directions (partis cunctatur in omnis); he brandishes his teeth (dentibus infrendens); he shakes spears from his back (tergo decutit hastas).

## Option G - Villains

## Extract 10 Livy, Ab Urbe Condita 1.59.10-1.60.1

10. (a) The unworthy murder [1] of Servius Tullius [1] and that Tullius's daughter [1] drove over his body in a chariot [1].
(b) Because these deeds were not at all easy (haudquaquam facilia) [1]; for writers to relate (relatu scriptoribus) [1].
(c) They stripped the king of his power [1]; and banished Tarquin [1] and his family [1]
(d) He picked "juniors" (iunioribus lectis) [1]; he went to Ardea/to the camp (Ardeam in castra est profectus) [1]; he left Lucretius to command the city (imperium Lucretio relinquit). [1]
(e) Award [3] if the meaning has been fully communicated and vocabulary and grammar are rendered correctly. Award [2] if the meaning has been communicated and vocabulary and grammar are rendered adequately despite inaccuracies. Award [1] if the meaning has not been communicated adequately and vocabulary and grammar are not rendered adequately. Award [ 0$]$ if the work does not reach a standard described by the descriptors above.
